HIDDEN HARDSHIP RESEARCH

On 24th November, Katrina was invited to an event in Moreton in Marsh, sharing the findings of a research project focused around rural poverty. Dr Stephanie Denning lives in the North Cotswolds and is an Assistant Professor at the Centre for Trust, Peace and Social Relations at Coventry University. She is a social and cultural geographer whose research focusses on poverty, hardship, and faith-based responses to these.

In Spring and Summer 2023, Stephanie spent time at community groups and projects in a rural town and village in the North Cotswolds to gain understanding of the experience of people living in rural hardship. She interviewed staff, volunteers, and local people at the projects. She then worked with three households experiencing rural hardship – they kept diaries of their experiences and undertook three go-along interviews with Stephanie as they went about their daily life.

The research recognised that across the country, 17% of people living in rural communities are experiencing some forms of hardship. Dr Stepanie found that in areas like the North Cotswolds, this is often hidden within communities with greater affluence around and the financial income from tourism. This can make it harder for people to reach out and seek help. The diagram below shows some of the factors that families living in hardship face – amplified by the higher cost of living in rural communities.



The research came up with some recommendations as to how to make a difference – by raising awareness, promoting communities working together and advertising sources of help. Also, it is hoped this research will inform individual, voluntary sector and government responses to hardship. If you would like to find out more, have a look at:

Quick and Festive Cranberry Meringues (serves 6/preparation time 10 mins)

75g (3oz) cranberries4 tbsp maple syrup200ml (1/3 pint) double or whipping cream

6 ready-made meringue nests Zest and juice of 1 lime

- Put cranberries and maple syrup in a pan. Heat gently until syrup begins to bubble but don't let cranberries pop. Once cranberries are softened, place in a bowl and set aside until cold, stirring to keep them evenly coated in syrup.
- To serve, place meringue nests on individual plates. Whip cream to soft peaks and stir in lime juice and zest. Place a few prepared and chilled cranberries into the base of each meringue, spoon on some cream and top with more cranberries.
- Serve immediately.

NAUNTON

Autumn has flown through Naunton in a blaze of colour. This must be the prettiest time of year in our community; the drive into the village from any direction is quite breathtaking in its beauty. We are indeed blessed to live in such a spectacular place!

Nestled as we are amongst fields and farmlands, it was good and right to celebrate a festival of Harvest at the start of October. The church was simply decorated with fruit, veg and garden flowers. This year, we welcomed Lucye Deacon to St Andrews as part of this worship. A Trustee of the North Cotswolds Foodbank (part of the Trussell Trust), Lucye gave an informative talk on the background of our local Foodbank and how it works within our local context. Sadly, as in so many places, the needs are great. On this occasion, the gifts of food etc that were brought to the Harvest celebration were destined for the Foodbank, alongside the generous donations given on a weekly basis by villagers (there's always a collection box outside Valley View, on Chapel Hill over the weekend). The gifts of cash (£472) at this service were sent to the British Red Cross Moroccan Earthquake appeal. Rev'd Katrina also used the opportunity for thankfulness to acknowledge those people who help and support the life and work of St Andrews Church.

We were privileged to welcome back Dr Paul Roberts, village resident and Roman archaeologist, to the village hall at the start of October, where he generously shared his expertise in an informative and entertaining talk about 'Ancient Faces; the Romans in Egypt'. As part of this event, a delicious supper was served showcasing North African flavours to complement the subject. Paul has given a few of these talks over recent years and they are always popular to the point of selling out as soon as tickets go on sale! This year was no exception, and the sum of £2279 was raised for St Andrews funds. We are grateful to Paul for his kindness.

The Church was absolutely packed for a Memorial Service for Richard Houldsworth on October 28th.

Remembrance Sunday was marked this year on 12th November; a well attended service in our Church calendar. The Army and Royal Air Force were represented by serving villagers and, as is usual, names of the 'Fallen' were read out after the two-minute silence. A trumpeter played the Last Post and Reveille at the appropriate moments and a wreath was laid in memorial within the Church, before we all processed to the village War Memorial in the courtyard of the former Baptist Chapel to lay a second poppy wreath. Coffee followed in the old Chapel.

It has been a joy to welcome back Rev'd Catherine from maternity leave, and by the time this is published she and her little family will be on the other side of the world in New Zealand, where she will complete part of her training. We wish all the Cowies well as they embark on this huge adventure, and pray for God's blessing and peace to remain with them all.

We are tremendously thankful for the clergy team who minister amongst us. We are fortunate indeed to have our spiritual needs met by them.
