

I have really enjoyed both the conversations we have shared on Zoom, over the phone and email, and meeting people over garden fences as I've been exploring our parishes. WORSHIPPING IN THIS TIME ...

Since the beginning of July, it has become possible again for us to re-open our buildings for private prayer and public worship. We can do this, provided a detailed risk assessment is worked through and put into action, that the buildings are well cleaned and that distancing and hygiene measures are put in place. Each of our church communities has been looking at these and working towards them, making local decisions and we are pleased to say that by the end of July, some of our church buildings are open for private prayer and some are opening for some services. We are trying to do this gradually and safely, in order to limit risk and keep our communities as healthy as possible.

During July and August, our pattern for worship each Sunday will include a 9.15am online Zoom Morning Prayer and a 6pm Evening Prayer service which will rotate around some of our churches. For the coming weeks, these will be:

2 August – St. Michael and All Angels', Guiting Power

9 August – St. Mary's, Lower Slaughter

16 August – St. Andrew's, Naunton

23 August – St. Peter's, Upper Slaughter

30 August - St. Mary's, Temple Guiting

6 September - St. Michael and All Angels', Guiting Power

The community response in our Benefice to the needs of our neighbours has been tremendous during this crisis. In the same way, when we asked for help for the "Feeding the 5000" initiative we were overwhelmed by the offers of support and encouragement for such a worthy cause. We had an amazing number of volunteer drivers come forward to deliver food, as well as people allowing us to use their cooler bags and boxes and ice blocks; the use of freezers, transport for the freezers and permission from the trustees of Lower Slaughter Village

Hall to house them. We are deeply grateful for all of this and to all of you.

Although "Feeding the 5000" is winding down now, "The Long Table", which is the project in Stroud which the Diocese teamed up with, will still be able to supply us with meals for the vulnerable.

The Long Table has a vision for all to be able to eat good nutritious food. The new family style meals will be available in family sized portions and can be bought or paid for according to means, or not paid for at all if that is the need. We do not say they are free, because they will have been paid for through grants and the meals that have been paid for.

By vulnerable we mean a lack of financial means, but also those who are poorly, who have been bereaved or who are working all hours – anyone who just needs the comfort of a hot meal from someone who cares.

Our neighbourhoods have been blessed by those who have kept an eye and listening ear out for those in need. "The Long Table" meals may be another way to offer love and support.


FUNERAL AT TEMPLE GUITING

In these dark times a light is beginning to show through, despite all the odds. Zoom Sunday Services have continued uninterrupted throughout the "lockdown", access to St Michael's for personal prayer has gone ahead, and we now look forward to our first post-"lockdown" evening Benefice Service on 2nd August at 6pm at St Michael's. We have all enjoyed the online Zoom services, a rare chance to chat and join in worship with friends and neighbours from other villages in the Benefice.

Throughout the Coronavirus period of safeguarding, life has continued. The village has pulled together - shopping for the elderly and infirm has been organised on a weekly basis by local volunteers, delicious food has been cooked and delivered at very reasonable costs by The Farmcote Estate and even Sunday lunches cooked and delivered to the elderly by Michele & Kevin Boote free of charge, transport to and from Doctors Surgeries and Hospital also arranged. A truly magnificent effort by the village itself, villagers and church members involved at every turn assisting the village initiatives.

Sadly Church finances have been badly hit, no activity or collections, leaving us in a precarious financial position. Despite the total lack of activity in the Church building, fundraising has gone on, thanks to a continued flow of bric a brac donations from the village and around, Julia has been selling items online and raising some funds. St Michael's will be holding a bumper Bric a Brac Market outside in the Churchyard on Saturday 29th August, 1pm to 5pm, Please let us know if you can donate any bric a brac for the sale.

Finally, after 3 years of planning, work has started on the new toilet and store building in the Churchyard. It is expected to be finished about early September. The toilet will be open for public use as well as for Churchgoers, a great addition to the new playground equipment that has been added to the nearby children's playground facilities which is now open. We have been waiting for this toilet facility since 1180!!! Thank you Roland for your persistence in raising the finance and seeing this project through.

Temple Guiting School

We have had an amazing last few weeks of term. We reopened after lockdown on June 2nd with only 3 Bubbles – a group of no more than 15 children that cannot mix with any other bubbles. We were very fortunate to be able to use the Village Hall in Temple Guiting to house 2 of our bubbles each day. Every available centimetre of space was used including the library to make sure our bubbles didn't mix. Having the Village field was brilliant too because it meant we could all go out to play in our bubbles and run around without contact.





To help keep ourselves healthy and clean we have had to learn new rules for washing hands, we now have a few songs we sing to help us scrub for 20 seconds but also so we remember to keep clean. We have now got 2 very shiny new stainless outside sinks so wherever we are out playing we can always wash hands.

To welcome everyone back to school one of our very talented staff created a banner so each time a new bubble started they had a warm welcome and knew we had missed them.





Although many things had to change, we have managed to keep doing Assemblies via a Zoom call, completed a sports day even though we couldn't invite anyone to watch and had a socially distant picnic and celebration for our very special Year 6 leavers. Our term has not ended quite as we had planned but we can honestly say the smiles and laughter of the children when they returned has made everything so worth all the cleaning, distancing and risk assessing. It has been a wonderful few weeks, we all feel ready for a holiday and are so looking forward to a new start in September.
